## GNÁTHRIALACHA/STANDING ORDERS

In order that the proceedings of the Annual General Meeting be carried out without delay, the following standing orders will be observed:

- 1. The Proposer of a Motion, Amendment or Resolution may speak for five minutes, and not more than five minutes.
- 2. A Delegate speaking to a resolution or an amendment must not exceed three minutes.
- 3. The proposer of a Resolution or an Amendment may speak for a second time for three minutes, before a vote is taken, but no other delegate may speak for a second time to the same Resolution or Amendment.
- 4. The Chairman, may at any time, he considers a matter has been sufficiently discussed, call on the proposer for a reply and when that has been given A VOTE MUST BE TAKEN.
- 5. A Delegate may, with the consent of the Chairman move that THE QUESTION BE NOW PUT, after which, when the Proposer has spoken, A VOTE HAS TO BE TAKEN.
- 6. Where the AGM considers it appropriate, a vote may be by secret ballot.
- 7. Any motion seeking additions or amendments to the Constitution or Rules must have a majority equal to two-thirds of those present, entitled to vote and voting.
- 8. Standing Orders shall not be suspended for the purpose of considering any matter not on the Agenda, except by the consent of the equal to TWO-THIRDS OF THOSE PRESENT AND VOTING.
- 9. The Chairman may change the order of items on the agenda with the support of a simple majority of those present, entitled to vote and voting.

#### **SECRETARY'S REPORT 2023**

We may not have acquired many pieces of silverware on the field of play and the big one still evades us but if winning cups and trophies is all Clonduff GAA Club is about then it's time many of us put our hands into our pockets and sat back!

Since our last AGM, the Senior Camogs annexed the Ulster and All Ireland Intermediate Club titles – the second time they have achieved that! In the current year the U16 Camogs retained their League and Championship titles, U14 Camogs, U13 and U15 Footballers also collected League titles – but more importantly, we've retained and grown our numbers particularly among our young people – we fielded a Minor Hurling team for first time in 15 years, will have 3 x U14 Boys Football teams – another first in Clonduff. Our female participation continues to grow with many of the younger girls and some of the adult ones playing both LGFA and Camogie – We just need the Boards all to communicate and cooperate with setting the fixtures!

During the year we joined the 'GAA Green Club' initiative to look at ways of conserving energy and sustainability; and in the same vein we became part of the '100milliontreesproject.ie' giving over a small area of 'Brown's Field' to accommodate up to 2,000 native Irish trees.

Away back in 2007 Clonduff was one of the Ulster Club that piloted the Club Maith Initiative – now 15 years later, as the programme is being rolled out across the country and being administered from Croke Park, Clonduff is one of clubs involved in the final Ulster programme – the portfolio has been submitted and we are awaiting the outcome.

A very comprehensive Coaching Strategy was rolled out across all the codes earlier in the year and it will be rigorously implemented in the coming season. The aim of this Strategy is to give every child the chance to play our games and to develop their skills and attributes. For our younger players, these early years should be about development and not necessarily about winning trophies.

All our adult players were involved in a comprehensive Strength and Conditioning programme provided by Ian Jones who has now been drafted into the Cork GAA set-up. Ian also provided an 'Athletic Development' programme. These programmes will become much more accessible to our players when our new gym is completed, hopefully before the beginning of next season.

Clonduff has also undertaken the development of a 5-year Strategy – this is currently a work in progress but it is hoped that it will be rolled out early into the next term.

The long-awaited refurbishment of the dressing rooms is currently taking place and should be completed pre-Christmas; a new gym should be up and running for the start of next season and work on the new ball-wall should be commencing within a matter of weeks.

It would be remiss of me here not to mention the considerable bequest Clonduff Club received during the year from our late President Dean Anthony Davies – the current development of the Ball Wall will forever keep his memory alive in our club!

#### **BALLRAÍOCHT (MEMBERSHIP)**

The Club membership in 2023 was again one of the largest in the County Total with a total membership of 940

- Adult Non-Playing 281
- Adult Playing 187 (108 male and 79 female)
- Juvenile 472 (258 male and 214 female)

Our Registrar Damian Fearon does a tremendous job coordinating all the memberships and getting most people to register themselves on the Foireann system; players and coaches are not insured if they are not registered. Again, it is essential to stress that all injuries need to be reported to the Club's Insurance Officer as soon as they happen so that all systems are in place if the claim progresses and there is no harm done if it does not progress.

We have a new Insurance Officer in place – many thanks to Clare McGilligan who, after some initial shadowing of her predecessor, Denise Close, took over the role with very few teething troubles.

Damian and Clare have carried out their roles for our members to a very high standard and we thank them sincerely. Thanks to Damian for the updated figures.

#### COSAINT (SAFEGUARDING/CHILD PROTECTION)

The safety and welfare of our young members is always to the forefront of our minds. Clonduff Club will continue to provide a safe and enjoyable environment where all children feel appreciated when playing our Games. The Club continues to follow the updated GAA Codes of Behaviour as a guidance for all our Policies and Procedures. Our Children's Officer continues to strive for 100% compliance in AccessNI, Safeguarding 1 and Foundation Coaching Award – not quite there just yet but this will be prioritised before the start of the 2024 season. It is of paramount importance that everyone is safeguarded and this includes the coaches just as much as the players. There were some minor issues during the year but these were able to be resolved in-house. Thanks to Safeguarding Officer Geraldine McPolin for the attached report.

#### SLAINTIÚIL AGUS PHOBAL (HEALTHY CLUB AND COMMUNITY)

We had very active Community and Healthy Club Officers in place during the year, and as a result when we realized that we had completed all the elements of a Healthy Club Award it was easy to collate the evidence and re-join the programme – Clonduff was one of the very first clubs to join the Healthy Club Initiative back in 2011 and two members of that team spoke at various conferences – I'm absolutely delighted that this is back on track again even though we had to start right back at the Foundation level. Just as the playing season was drawing to a close our Club was approached by The Confederation of Community Groups about facilitating 'Good Morning' Service providing a phone call to older isolated people in our locality. The response for volunteers has been immense and will be rolled out as soon as the training of volunteers has taken place.

A few days ago, we received word that Clonduff was selected as the preferred site for a new walking trail in the NMDDC – it may take a little bit of time but there will be no excuses for not taking up the challenge!

#### **RÉITEORIÍ REFEREES**

We are now one on the better equipped clubs with refereeing personnel – Many thanks to Dane Devlin, Ciarán Branagan, Eddie Clancy, Kevin McGrath, and Paddy Branagan (Sen). We wish Keving and Paddy well as they recover from injury.

Thanks also to our mentors and anyone else who has helped out with refereeing in Ladies Football, Hurling and/or Camogie Games and to our young people for taking up the whistle at tournaments and Go games. Keep up the good work! It's not an easy task but if we don't have referees, we won't have games.

#### TEANGA AGUS CULTÚR (LANGUAGE AND CULTURE)

The aims of the GAA include actively promoting, fostering and supporting all aspects of our Cultural Heritage, our Language and our Games. Clonduff very much fulfills those aims, even though we didn't have a dedicated Language and/or Cultural Officer in place.

Early in the year we joined the Joe MacDonagh Foundation and later applied for funding to run Irish classes – we received the maximum amount and this is now funding the running of 3 x 10-week Irish classes in the clubrooms organized by Rory Donnan, the Mourne Coordinator for Conradh na Gaeilge. Hopefully by the end of these classes we will be able to engage and active Language Officer!

Clonduff had 45 youngsters participating in Scór Na nÓg in 2023. The Novelty Act won the South Down title and it along with one of the Instrumental Music Groups and one of the Recitations qualified for the county finals. In Scór Sinsir our Set Dancers, who had only got together a couple of weeks earlier, and Eileen McCusker in Recitation won their respective County titles.

At the time of writing, the dancers are excitedly preparing for The All-Ireland Final in Killarney on 18<sup>th</sup> November! We wish them well, but above all enjoy the occasion!

Thankfully for the good of Scór, particularly at senior level, from 2024 Scór Sinsir is returning to its original late Winter/early Spring slot in the calendar where it will not be affected by the on-field County Finals and the Scór na nÓg will return to Autumn.

We had numerous Scór singers performing Amhrán na bhFiann at various County events and our Instrumental Musicians entertained at the LGFA Fundraiser in the Canal Court prior to their successful All-Ireland final appearance.

Many of those who participated in the Golden Jubilee celebration of Clonduff Youth Club have at one time or another represented Clonduff in Scór. And we will look forward to the fruits of the 'Comhaltás Chluain Daimh'. For Full Report see Appendix 3.

#### TRAENÁLAÍ AGUS CLUICHÍ (COACHING AND GAMES)

The hard-working Coaching Committee devised the 'Clonduff Player Pathway' to give every child, their parents and coaches a clear-cut sign post to the young person's personal development as a player and well-rounded young person.

They also attempted to implement a strategy whereby young players did not 'play up' an age group unless there were insufficient numbers at the higher age level. Those who 'play up' should be rotated and the coach of the younger age group should be the one to nominate the players.

#### PÁIRCEANNA AGUS ÁISEANNA (PLAYING FIELDS AND FACILITIES)

Brendan outlined all the work/improvements that had been carried out at the beginning and the end of 2023. He apologised to teams and mentors for the inconvenience caused but was hopeful that as the work was carried out in good time this year, the fields will be more than ready for the start of the new season.

Brendan wished to thank a lot of people for all of their help throughout the year and keeping the fields in such pristine condition. He specifically singled out Alastair for his 'Daily Usage Schedule' that kept everybody happy and maintained the playing surfaces. Lining out and marking the pitches was another constant along with the grasscutting.

In his report he apologised if he omitted any of his invaluable helpers. See Appendix 5.

Like all in Clonduff, Brendan was delighted to see the refurbishment of the dressing rooms – he appealed to mentors and players to respect our facilities by removing water bottles from the pitches and leaving the dressing rooms in a fit state.

Many thanks to the great band of volunteers who are ever-willing to lend a hand. And thanks too to Brendan for the report.

#### TACAIOCHT CLUICHI PEIL (ADULT FOOTBALL GAMES)

The Club fielded adult teams in Senior, Seconds, Thirds, U20, U19 in Football, Senior Hurling, Senior Camogie and Ladies Football. All are currently finished for the year with the exception of the U20 Footballers who have won all their group games and will now play a 2<sup>nd</sup> place finisher in another group in the quarter finals.

Thanks to Paul McConville, Anthony Grimes and James Kane for looking after this year's U20s.

The Senior Football Championship has been well documented, so I won't go into any more detail at this time. Many thanks to Adrian Cush and James Slater who have stepped away and we are now in pursuit of replacement. The PRFC only afforded the players one actual championship game, the first one having been conceded. In my opinion, these lads deserve the same treatment as other adult teams ie, round-robin or back-door! Thanks to Finbarr McConville and Eugene Branagan who looked after the PR games.

The Reserves/Thirds Footballers in Clonduff operate as a separate entity — unused players from PR are not involved. The got to semi-Finals of League and then beaten by Burren in the Preliminary rould of RFC after extra time. It was most disappointing that when Championship started, some clubs chose to use PR players as their championship did not start until a month later. Going forward we will be urging that these competitions begin simultaneously as they did in previous years. In the Fr Davies Shield games at the end of the season, a similar situation arose in that players who played their Club senior championship were 'allowed' to play in the competition.

Thanks to PJ McGreevy and Conor Maginn for once again looking after the Thirds.

It is my honest opinion that if we are to keep lads playing Football, we must have a proper structured season for U19/20 – our U19s effectively got a 4-week season February/March. The season for U20s is tagged on in October/November. This scenario is certainly not conducive to player retention.

Many thanks to Jamie Fegan and Tony Wilson for looking after the U19s in 2023.

#### NA FÓIRNE PEIL ÓIGE (YOUTH TEAMS)

In his report Football Youth Officer, Damian Fearon reported that around 230 boys were involved in Youth Football from the beginning to the end of the season.

A new strategy will be implemented in 2024 to help bring about even more development for years to come in Clonduff.

Well done to U15 players who secured Div II League title; at U13 x 2 teams the Div I team were runners up in their League and the Div 4 team won their league – in my opinion it is very unfair system that U15 Div II winners had to play in the A championship and the U13 Div 4 winners had to play in the B Championship. Surely if they had been of that standard they would have been playing in higher leagues.

We continued to attract and retain vast numbers of youngsters from P1 age up to and including P7.

With the age grades reverting to even-age groups, it looks like there will be 3 x U14 Clonduff teams in 2024. Damian thanked all the manager across the age ranges – see **Appendix 6.** Many thanks to Damian for the report.

#### PEIL NA MBÁN (LADIES GAELIC FOOTBALL)

Ladies Gaelic Football in Clonduff continues to grow at a fantastic rate with the club fielding groups at U6 and U8 for the first time ever – up on 60 little girls turned up – previously when combined with the boys there may have been a total of 9/10. This augurs very well for the future.

All the youngsters up to and including U10 participate in blitzes, with U10s, taking part every two weeks. U12s play in a league with no winners – they are 'placed' in preparation for grading two years hence.

All teams competed well throughout their leagues with U16s and Minors finishing top of their league – the Minors involved in League final on Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> November. Senior Ladies finished 3<sup>rd</sup> in their league.

U14 Ladies reached the semifinal of their championship which was a surprise to some but not to their mentors; There was a good Feile team that reached the A final – first time ever but just failed by a single point to Burren in the final. The U16s were in the A League and Championship and more than held their own. Many of the girls will be remaining in the age group next year.

The Minor Ladies are the only group to get one bite at the cherry – all other groups play round robin with at least 3 Championship games. The Clonduff girls recovered after a very poor first half but just left themselves too much to do. Having played their last league game on 20<sup>th</sup> July to go joint top of the group they have League play-off on Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> November – an incredible 16 weeks later. It is very difficult to keep players at this age group interested but this certainly does not give them any encouragement.

The Senior Ladies, following a decent league were hopeful of a good run in the championship — which they had but just fell short in the semifinal after a poor first half, taking the game back to a draw but lost by a very late point. Gaelic for Mothers and Others (G4MO) continues to gain a foothold in Clonduff and is indeed drawing in newcomers to the parish who may or may not have been previously involved in Ladies Gaelic Football — that is the glory about this aspect of the LGFA — it's all about a bit of craic and the exercise of course — which is the more important I'm not too sure!

Many congratulations to the young achievers – Laura Close on her Young Leadership Award and Emily Bingham-Abbot on here Colleges All Star.

Thanks to the Mooney Family for providing a new cup for competition in the Ladies Games.

Very many thanks to all those who coached the LGFA teams in 2023 – see <u>Appendix 7</u> for those involved. Special word of thanks to the Senior and Minor players who were involved in coaching the youngsters and thanks to Shereen for the report.

Juvenile Hurling in Clonduff continues to go from strength to strength in Clonduff with up on 100 children from P1-P7 age playing the ancient game and this can only augur well for the future. The U13 Hurlers became the first Clonduff team to play in Div 1 competing and more than holding their own with the Ards teams; the U15s finished their league joint top but lost out on head-to-head count with other joint leaders. And for the first time in 15 years Clonduff fielded an U17 team.

Clonduff once again hosted the Regional Feile with teams from Antrim, Meath, Dublin Derry, Kildare and Down taking part – a great occasion at the club.

Unfortunately, the senior team was relegated from Senior League at the end of the season but no doubt, with the talent coming through, they will bounce back at the earliest opportunity.

The Annual Péarce Branagan Memorial Poc Fada was again a resounding success but we must encourage more of our extremely talented Camogs to take part, some of whom could undoubtedly give the men a run for their money!

The undoubted highlight of the year was the Annual Sean Cairns Coaching Day and this year the Guest coach was none other than the Great Sean Óg Ó hAlpín who endeared himself to everyone who attended this outstanding event in Clonduff.

In his report, Shane thanked the coaches – for full report see <u>Appendix 8</u>. Many thanks to Shane Quinn for the Report.

#### **CAMÓGAÍOCHT (CAMOGIE)**

Guinevra will deliver the Camogie Report <u>Appendix 9</u>. Speedy and full recovery to Paula following her horrendous injury just before the Senior Semi Final. Congratulations to the U16 girls on retaining the League and Championship Double and to the U14s on winning the Shield.

#### LIATHRÓID LÁIMHE (HANDBALL)

With some issues still existing re the local Handball Alley, some of juveniles travelled to Newry for practice but it wasn't in vain – Therese Cowan collected the County and Ulster U15 titles whilst her brother Sean Óg just fell short in the U13 Ulster after winning the Down title. After collecting the County title, Clodagh Kelly was runner up in the Ulster U17 competition. P7 pupil Oisin McConville reached the final of the Cumann na mBunscóil championship. Well done boys and girls and to your coaches Sean and Colin.

Clonduff GAA continues to pay rental for the Handball Alley to Newry, Mourne and Down District Council and if this issue was clarified we would be able to take advantage of our local facility.

Handball would be a wonderful indoor winter activity and could easily be developed across the entire club but additional coaches would be required.

#### SCOILEANNA, COLÁISTÍ AGUS OLLSCOILEANNA (SCHOOLS, COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES)

The Club grounds are always made available to the local primary schools as their needs required. Our grounds are also used to host Colleges games when possible. Thanks to our local primary and secondary schools for continuing to promote our national games and culture.

On the reverse side, St Patrick's Primary School is available to us for hosting specific events such as Scór and F2F Seminars.

#### **DISCIPLÍN (DISCIPLINE)**

We all need to be disciplined in our attitude towards the Club and Officials who visit the club. Discipline towards the Club means using the Club facilities for your own enjoyment and leaving the facilities ready for the next group to use. All team mentors should ensure all bottles, clothes and equipment is gathered from the pitches and club premises after each training session or game – this is an important life skill for our players to acquire and is a culture which must be instilled from a very early age.

#### **CLUB SÓISIALTA (SOCIAL CLUB)**

There were various events, both social and educational held in the clubrooms throughout the year. One of

highlights, and not something that happens too often was the hosting of the celebration for our former player and Scór participant Mary Catherine Murray when she took her first vows into the religious life.

A number of regular and new events, many of which are outlined in Shauna's report in **Appendix 2** were facilitated.

There was also a number of other private functions, ie christenings and funerals.

We would like to thank everyone who helped out with the cleaning, setting up, catering and everything else that kept things running smoothly.

#### SIOPA na gCLUB (THE CLUB SHOP)

The Club shop has now been in existence for over 10 years and continues to provide merchandise to members as well as refreshments to visitors.

Whilst the Christmas Club has gone online this year, many people still like the idea of 'paying-in' over the couple of months up to Christmas. There were 46 orders placed via the shop and 138 directly online with O'Neills – a wonderful response to the first year of the online Shop (there were 170 Christmas Orders in 2022). Merchandise ordered online will be delivered to Club Shop and customers will be advised of their availability for collection. During the year advice was given by Conor Milligan (Sports Nutritionist) about the stocking of Healthier alternatives in the Tuck Shop. This will continue to be developed.

Once again, many thanks to Goretta, Noleen and Shane Cairns and to Lorraine Bloomfield for all the hours they spent in the Club shop and to Andrea Morgan and Grainne Fearon for looking after the online Merchandise orders and to everyone else who has helped out in any way. It should be noted that during lockdown Clonduff ran an inhouse online Christmas Club organised and administered by Lorraine.

The shop will be moving into a dedicated area in the new gym facility, which will be open throughout the day – perhaps we should look into making refreshments available throughout the day either via vending machines or tea/coffee machine.

#### **FORBAIRT (DEVELOPMENT)**

At the beginning of 2023, Ross put together a steering group with the aim of developing a 5-year Strategy Plan for the next 5 years under the guidance of Grainne Killen. They were asked to focus on six specific areas - Community and Culture, Coaching and Games, Health and Wellbeing, Facilities Development, Governance and Finance and Communication. This is still a work in progress but it is hoped the draft plan will be launched early 2024. See <a href="Appendix 10">Appendix 10</a> for update from Grainne. By and large, a lot of that work is already underway with the following physical development currently taking place:

- Dressing rooms and toilets are being refurbished and will be completed well before the commencement of the 2024 season.
- The new gym facility will also be completed pre-2024 logistics of this have yet to be finalized.
- Work will commence shortly on the Ball Wall.

#### **DEONTAIS (GRANTS)**

Thankfully we have a small group of knowledgeable members looking after club grant applications on a voluntary and regular basis. Many thanks to Aveen McShane and Ciarán Crosbie, who along with Ross, are constantly on the lookout for grants to help fulfil the needs of our club.

Sheenagh Walsh has the mammoth task of keeping Clonduff's Social Media channels updated, current and safe. Clonduff has FaceBook, Twitter and Instagram accounts. Many thanks Shereen and Sheenagh for this very public picture of our club. The Club website continues to provide an up-to-date picture of Fixtures and Results and a very detailed historical record of happenings in the club.

#### **RIARACHÁN (ADMINISTRATION)**

Our games are the public face of our club and we are highly appreciative of the mentors and managers who take on these roles – there would be no point in having a club if this wasn't happening! #### Appendix 1 - Children, Health and Well-Being Officer Report

#### **Children and Welfare**

Since commencing my post as Children's Officer together with Health and Well Being Officer my priority was to ensure that all coaches and mentors had completed their Access NI together with their Child Protection level 1 and all those who required refresher courses completed these prior to the training season commencement. I have co-ordinated with the Ulster Council to ensure several face-to-face trainings were provided for Club volunteers and online links were provided.

There has been a significant increase in compliance with both mandatory trainings for all coaches, mentors and volunteers for children within Clonduff Club however we still have not achieved 100% compliance.

Future Action- Moving forward next year it is of imperative importance that EVERY Coach, Mentor and volunteer provide evidence of compliance prior to taking up volunteering position. This is to ensure each, and every adult and child is safeguarded in the year ahead. Without our volunteers and their expertise, we as a club could not operate however it is of paramount importance that everyone is safeguarded.

In total I have received 5 concerns within Hurling, LGFA and GAC which all have been resolved with no further issues.

#### **Health and Well-Being**

The year commenced in co-ordination with Irish Life and 'Light up Ireland'. We hosted a walk and talk in January and facilitated tea, coffee and hot chocolate for all walkers supporting a local community business.

Future Action— Current walking track unsafe for older people, prams, and kids on balance bikes – options to host this next year?

With the support from the Ulster council, we hosted an information night for coaches, mentors, volunteers and parents focusing on Autism awareness.

Future Action – Plan ahead and ensure minimal training occurring at the time, possible save the dates? Additional SEN Inclusive awareness evenings for coaches, mentors and volunteers creating an awareness and achieve INCLUSIVE CLUB status. Establish links with neighbouring clubs, initiatives and work collectively.

Future Action- Prior to the season commencing host a night for Parents, Coaches, mentors and volunteers promoting and sharing best practice. Sharing code of conduct and establishing a baseline for best practice as a club.

Future Action – Provide a Bullying workshop for coaches, mentors, volunteers and players. Establish Anti Bullying policy.

Health and wellbeing Foundation Award presented to Clonduff this year. I have attended training and worked collaboratively with the secretary of Clonduff in submitting our application and ensuring all criteria was met.

This would not have been possible without the commitment of our Community Officer who provided information evenings on Eating well, Vaping, Drugs awareness and death by suicide cycling awareness initiatives.

Future Action- Establish future and continued links with neighbouring clubs in relation to making Health and well-being part of our club.

#### **Appendix 3 – Cultural Activities in Clonduff 2023**

#### **Cultural Activities in Clonduff 2023**

On the Cultural front Clonduff had 45 youngsters participating in Scór Na nÓg across six of the eight disciplines in Down. The new and novel Novelty Act (penned by Caroline McGreevy) won the South Down title but just lost out in the County Final to a very 'un-new' one, one of the Instrumental Music Groups and one of the Recitations also qualified for the county finals.

Scór Sinsir has suffered right across the country with the change from late winter/early spring to Autumn over the last 5 years or so and 2023 was no different. However, Clonduff was one of the better represented clubs. Sean Hillen, who along with Joe Farrell, introduced Set Dancing to Clonduff around the mid-1980s, and won All Ireland Scór na nÓg titles in 1991 and 1993, passed away at the end of August 2023. Many of the former pupils turned up for his wake and funeral they decided to they would give the upcoming Scór Sinsir a go. With just a couple of weeks to the Down programme they got together, put their best foot forward and won the County title, with four of those original 1991 winners still doing it with aplomb! They qualified for the Ulster final and lo and behold they just went and won that too! I guess Sean was looking down on them from above! At the time of writing, they are excitedly getting ready for The All-Ireland Final in Killarney on 18<sup>th</sup> November! We wish them well, but above all enjoy the occasion!

Not to be outdone by the dancers, when Stalwart Eileen McCusker learned there were no Recitation entries in the whole of Down she said 'OMG (or words to that effect) we can't have that'. So up she gets on the stage in Mayobridge and walks away with another County title under her belt! Her performance in the Ulster Semi Final was impeccable but she just missed out on qualification.

The good news about the timings of Scór is that from 2024 Scór Sinsir is returning to its original spot in the calendar where it will not be affected by the on-field County Finals and the Scór na nÓg will return to Autumn. So, it will really only be a couple of months until these people are back on stage again! Half the preparation is already done!

Our Scór singers who competed Amhrán na bhFiann workshops with the last three years were often call upon to perform at various County events including County Championships in all codes. When Down Ladies reached the All-Ireland Final back in August, our Instrumental Musicians were called upon to supply the entertainment for patrons arriving at the Afternoon Tea Party Fundraiser in the Canal Court!

The Clonduff Youth Club ran a major concert in the INF Hall in October to celebrate their Golden Jubilee – onstage was a 26-piece Trad Orchestra, numerous singers and others entertainers, most of whom had represented Clonduff in Scór at some time in their lives. The orchestra was co-ordinated and conducted by our own Siobhan Doyle and the Fear an Tí and Musical Director was none other than Matt McGinn, that well-known folk singer, who himself had competed in Ulster Scór Finals in a Ballad Group.

Wonderful news on the cultural front in the Parish of Clonduff is the birth of 'Comhaltas Chluain Daimh' offering lessons in Banjo, Guitar, Bodhrán, Tin Whistle, Accordion, Fiddle, Grúpa Ceol' – more exciting news for the future of Scór in Clonduff!

#### Appendix 4 - Coaching and Youth Games in Clonduff

#### **Coaching and Youth Games in Clonduff**

The Coaching Committee sat down at the start of the 2023 season with the aim of compiling a 'Player Pathway' process across all of our four Codes.

The objective was to develop a 'Step' process for the 6-year-old child that first comes down to Clonduff Park to Kick a Ball or Strike a Sliothar for the first time and show them the Pathway that will make them competent in the Skills of our Games and Develop them as they go through their Juvenile Careers and leave them ready to step up to Senior Grade when they finish at Minor level.

The Committee reviewed different examples of Player Pathways that have been compiled by Dublin GAA, Wexford GAA, Antrim GAA and Leinster GAA.

#### Common themes were:

- Age-appropriate challenges
- a Player-centred approach
- Skills Development
- Small-sided Games and
- Player enjoyment

The Committee used these successful programmes to develop a Player Pathway Template for our own four Codes to utilise.

There were several Coach Education days organised throughout the year with Guest Coaches Micheal Gerard Doherty and Philip Kerr imparting their knowledge on different aspects of Coaching.

The Coaching sub-committee also developed a strategy to give every child the chance to develop and play at their own age grade.

The premise is that, up to and including U15 boys/U16 girls, if there are enough players in the age group panel, players will not be brought up from a lower level unless there is a shortage of numbers. If there is a shortage of numbers, the lower-age coach should be asked to provide players on a rotational basis.

#### Field & Facilities sub-committee Report 2023

At the beginning of the year Prunty Pitches verti-drained the three pitches and sanded the main pitch. The goal areas of all pitches were all re-sodded along with some outfield areas also on main and top pitches. We had hoped to do this work in December 2022 but due to the weather it wasn't able to be completed until early February 2023 which unfortunately was an inconvenience for teams starting pre-season training. Thank you also to the volunteers involved in the cleanup days which took place during the year - this work really made a difference.

Thanks to PJ McGreevy for ordering the fertiliser for the fields and Murtagh Walls for spreading twice per year.

Thanks to Alistair McGilligan for his work in facilitating the pitch schedule and accommodating with limited pitch availability.

Thank you to Tommy Kelly, Alistair McGilligan and Anthony Morgan for lining the pitches.

Many thanks to Tommy who helped me to cut the grass on a regular basis throughout the year.

It is fantastic to see that work has commenced on the refurbishment of our dressing rooms due to be completed in advance of the new playing season - thanks to all who made this possible.

Prunty was back in October and carried out the necessary work on the pitches so it's good to have it done early - the three pitches are verti-drained; main pitch and top pitch (also re-seeded) has been sanded and re-sodded. Apologies for the inconvenience caused to the teams still playing in competitions at this time.

Could all teams and mentors please ensure the pitches and dressing rooms are left appropriately, ie: no bottles left etc. - it would be great if we could create this culture in our club. In the word of our Former President Dean Davies, 'the strength of our faith, is the strength of our church'. Therefore, the strength of our club is the way we keep our facilities.

Thanks again to everyone who had assisted with the field and facilities in anyway in 2023. Apologies if I have omitted anyone, it wasn't intentional.

For first time Clonduff fielded separate U6 and U8 teams which was necessary with the age differential with the boys – encouraged more little girls to come along – around 30 @ U6 and much the same @ U8. Previously we would have been lucky to have 9/10 young girls at this age. Many thanks to Louise, Mark, Angeline, Jackie and Kathy Ann for organising the training and blitzes for U6 and to Seamie, Lorraine, Ciaran, Kelly, Paul, Keavy and Leann for doing same for U8.

The 2 x U10 teams comprising 27 girls played in home/away blitzes every 2 weeks and they were sometimes accompanied by our U8s if the other team had girls at that age. Many thanks to Joeleen and Christine, as part of the management team, who have greater things to look forward to in the near future – girls we wish you and your families all the best. Also involved in U10 was Jayme, Eugene, and young coaches Lily and Blaithín.

The U12s, with a panel of 20, competed in a league but because competition is not encouraged at this age, they were given league placings but no winners – apparently this determines what league they are entered into @ U14 in 2 years' time. Many thanks to management team of Louis, Paul, Nuala and Paula.

In LGFA in the Championships across all age groups a team of players has to be drawn up and submitted to the County Board before the Championship begins – there is no leeway for rotating players from lower age grade. In the Leagues all players can be run-on/off with no limitation to the number of subs. However, in the Championships, only 5 subs are allowed.

Our U14 girls had a very small panel and drew on the U12s to supplement the numbers and allow for subs. They found the going tough in the league and unfortunately some girls drifted away because they weren't winning many games. Come Championship time, the girls, plus 4 x U12s gelled into a superb little team and actually reached the Championship Semi Final! Many thanks to Damien, Kieran, Gary, Conan and Aisling for managing the U14s.

The Feile team consisted of players from both U16 and U14 – they played in Div 1 and reached the final only to lose by a single point. The team was jointly managed by U16 and U14 managements.

The U16 team had a bit of a turbulent start but eventually settled down and played some great football, winning the Summer League and competing very well in their Championship group just missing out on the play-offs. Many thanks to Marie, Niall, Charlene and Gary for managing the team.

Perhaps the team that can feel the hardest done-by in the LGFA competitions are the Minors – they are in the Summer League Final on Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> November, having played their last league game on 20<sup>th</sup> July. Having sat all summer without a competitive game, they played their one and only championship game on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> October. This is the only age group that is not given an opportunity to play championship in a round-robin format! Where does equality come into this equation? Thanks to Damien, Shereen and Jackie for managing the Minors.

Seniors – The Senior Ladies played 14 league games, winning 9 and drawing 1; finished in 3<sup>rd</sup> place and went on to reach the semi final of the championship. They played some exciting football but in a number of cases were slow out of the blocks in the first half and left themselves an awful lot to do in the second half. This was particularly true in the semi final where they were 10 points down at half time, put in a tremendous second half and actually took the lead but succumbed to two late points from Annaclone who were playing at home. Many thanks to Brian, Marc and Shereen who have now completed their 3-year team.

The recreational of the LGFA is Gaelic for Mothers and Other (G4MO) which got off the ground just last year. Numbers have remained in around 18 with new faces and new people to the parish coming along and getting involved not only for the exercise but also the craic, which there was plenty of! Well done to Louise for the last couple of years.

Earlier in the year Minor player Laura Close undertook the Young Leadership programme (BUA) delivered through the LGFA. She gained invaluable experience and hopes to implement what she learned, not only on the field of play but also in her every-day life. Well done Laura – a great role model for other young girls!

Quite a number of our young LGFA players were also on County teams and County Development squads – thanks for representing your club and county with pride. U16 Coach Marie Grant was also involved in the County set up – thanks Marie.

Emily Bingham-Abbot was one such young representatives and following her exploits with Down Minors was drafted into the Senior Squad and had the privilege of collecting an All-Ireland medal in Croke Park when Down Seniors won the All-Ireland Junior title when they defeated Limerick in mid-August. But that did not stop Our Emily – she was selected for Colleges All Star trails through St Mark's Warrenpoint, as following the second trial came away with the All Star under her belt! Well done Emily – such wonderful achievements at age 17!

Our U15s had a strong campaign which begun with the Féile. The lads played against Division 1 sides and were narrowly defeated by Ballycran and Carryduff before beating Bredagh on a great day in Portaferry. The boys also competed well against top level sides in the Regional Féile, hosted by Clonduff, against clubs from Antrim, Meath, Dublin, Derry and Kildare. The lads were unlucky not to win their league as they were pipped to the title on points difference on a Head-to-Head against Ballela/ Ballyvarley combination of St Patricks. Unfortunately, the boys were defeated in the Championship Final against St Patricks having beaten them in the group stages. Despite having no silverware, it was a very productive year with serious strides made. Thanks to management team of Michéal Murtagh, Liam Boyle and Ciaran Kearney.

#### **U17 Hurling**

This was a landmark year for the club as it was the first time in 15 years Clonduff entered an U17 team on our own. Whilst it was a learning curve for this young group mostly made up of U16 players, their attitude and commitment was very impressive. After some tough results, the lads capped off the year with a superb Championship victory against Iveagh Gaels (Warrenpoint/ Craobh Rua). The further development of players across the pathway was a huge boost for the club. Thanks to management team of Ciaran Kearney, Anthony Binks and Shane Quinn.

#### **Senior Hurling**

The early part of the season proved to be a difficult one for the Senior Hurlers due to a small squad facing challenges through injuries. Unfortunately, we have been relegated to Division 2 for 2024. Thankfully momentum did pick up for Championship and despite a defeat to Carryduff, the lads had a strong display to win comfortably against Ballela. A very physical battle against Warrenpoint ensued with the game going right down to the wire. Unfortunately, Warrenpoint prevailed with a goal in the dying moments of the game to deny the boys an Intermediate Championship Semi-Final place. Thanks to the management team of Barry Armstrong, Anthony Tinnelly and Francis Quinn.

This year a new Championship structure was introduced without any meaningful consultation with the club which resulted in two sides dropping down to the Intermediate Championship having played 5 group games in the Senior grade. It is clear that structures across all hurling grades require meaningful consultation with clubs.

Clonduff Camogie AGM 2023 - Friday 10th November

#### **Secretary report**

A successful year for Clonduff camogie to date with 219 registered members for 2023 (10 non-playing and 209 playing). Teams fielded for all age groups from P1 up to Senior including a Feile team (u15), Junior team and U20 team for individual tournament. The Senior team concluded the 2022 season with a second historic All-Ireland Intermediate win.

#### **Playing Teams**

P1 Managers: Kitty Fegan and Pauline McConville

• This year we had 20 P1s playing. From the start of the year to the end of the year you could see the progression weekly in the basic skills. They were also introduced to the basic fundamentals of playing a game and as the weeks progressed you could see them developing as a great wee team. Unfortunately, a lot of teams wouldn't have the same numbers at this age group so we were limited in getting matches. However, we did travel to Attical where the girls got their first taste of a competitive match in a yella Jersey. Thanks to Pauline McConville who helped with the coaching up until her knee operation and thanks to the parents for all their support. Excellent wee girls and I look forward to seeing them develop into fantastic Clonduff players in years to come.

**P2/3** Managers: Edel Lennon, Andrea, Niamh Murphy and Eileen Hamill 5th April 2023

P3s started their season with games to Creanmore (Armagh) who travelled to us. We had 8 girls – and played 7 a side, The girls had 10-minute games and positions were rotated at half time. Tea and coffee for provided to parents and the children received crisps and minerals in the club after the games, there was a short speech thanking Creanmore for visiting. Our Senior Captain Jenna Boden presented with the All-Ireland O Duffy Cup, this was an opportunity for our own girls and Creanmore to have a photo taken with the cup. Jenna reinforced the message to the girls with respect of continuing to play camogie with their friends and having fun. It was agreed we would travel to Creanmore for some games in the near future.

22nd April 2023

Following the ferry strike to the Ards Peninsula, Attical hosted the first Primary School blitz, we had nine P2s/P3s who travelled to Mourne, they played in horrible conditions, it was wet and cold however they each had plenty of game time and displayed excellent skills - striking first time and tackling. Parents were all asked to complete the future development of the club.

24th April (Training)

The girls commenced on The Clonduff Way – Youth Player Pathway. Andrea made out a list of the girl's names and the skills to be checked. These skills need to be recorded before the beginning/end of May.

The week before we had already checked each girl's stick was the correct size - appropriate to their height. The ready position - lock/correct grip were also checked. It was a matter of repeating these skills tonight and updating the data. Eileen introduced and demonstrated each skill. The skills covered at training tonight were – Dribble the ball 10m / or 0.5m. Solo a bean bag and back 5 m and back - Strike of both sides. The P3 girls finished off training with 4v4 match. We can't let them go home without a match!

7th May 2023

The P4/P5s had arranged their own blitz with other local clubs which was held in Kilcoo - We then contacted Kilcoo and arranged for our P2/P3s to have some games with their girls, we had a really good response from parents for these games, (17 girls). In addition to this we plan to have more local games in the coming months alongside the county blitzes.

5th June

An Riocht travelled to us on our training sessions for some games, it was a beautiful sunny evening. We had 21 girls and An Riocht had 12, we had four teams each, Clonduff girls got to play An Riocht once, and each team ended up with three games each. All girls received sweets and ice pops.

12 June – Warrenpoint travelled to us on our training session for some games with 8 girls - Clonduff had all our girls in attendance, an additional training session was organised and we rotated the girls, so everyone had adequate game time.

5th August 2023 – Carryduff hosted this Primary School blitz – we had a great response and were able to enter two teams. It started off as a very wet morning but thankfully by early afternoon it was clear skies for the girls to play. The teams played to a hooter with 12 minutes duration of each game and 3 minutes between games. It was a well organised event, all parents were thanked for their continued support, encouragement and travelling to Carryduff.

An Riocht Blitz 9th September 2023

The final county blitz of 2023 was held in An Riocht, we had two teams entered this blitz. The girls worked really hard and played really well in very hot day.
