GNÁTHRIALACHA/STANDING ORDERS

In order that the proceedings of the Annual General Meeting be carried out without delay, the following standing orders will be observed:

1. The Proposer of a Motion, Amendment or Resolution may speak for five minutes, and not more than five minutes.
2. A Delegate speaking to a resolution or an amendment must not exceed three minutes.
3. The proposer of a Resolution or an Amendment may speak for a second time for three minutes, before a vote is taken, but no other delegate may speak for a second time to the same Resolution or Amendment.
4. The Chairman, may at any time, he considers a matter has been sufficiently discussed, call on the proposer for a reply and when that has been given A VOTE MUST BE TAKEN.
5. A Delegate may, with the consent of the Chairman move that THE QUESTION BE NOW PUT, after which, when the Proposer has spoken, A VOTE HAS TO BE TAKEN.
6. Where the AGM considers it appropriate, a vote may be by secret ballot.
7. Any motion seeking additions or amendments to the Constitution or Rules must have a majority equal to two-thirds of those present, entitled to vote and voting.
8. Standing Orders shall not be suspended for the purpose of considering any matter not on the Agenda, except by the consent of the equal to TWO-THIRDS OF THOSE PRESENT AND VOTING.
9. The Chairman may change the order of items on the agenda with the support of a simple majority of those present, entitled to vote and voting.

SECRETARY'S REPORT 2024

The new season was just beginning when the most unimaginable news came through that one of our Senior Dual Players, Lorcan Branagan had tragically lost his life in the far side of the world! And before Lorcan's funeral took place, one of our bright young adult players, Charlie Brown, suffered a severe head injury and was hospitalized for quite some time. These horrendous events cast an incredible pall over our entire community and the big question over our club was 'Would we or could we survive'? But the people of Clonduff Parish and particularly the Players of Clonduff GAA Club are the most resilient people on earth. Not only did we survive, but we grew as a community with Lorcan the focal point of that growth.

While we still await the breakthrough at adult level, in all codes with Camogie the exception, progress on-field is evident (see individual reports). However, Clonduff is about much more than playing games. Since our last AGM, Clonduff has achieved the following non-playing/non-competitive goals:

Resurrect the Young Volunteer Award

Niall Geoghegan, Principal of St Paul's PS and a keen athlete, has started an after-school running club for children from both primary schools but so far the potential athletes are confined to St Paul's.

The launch of our new 5-Year Strategy was delayed due to circumstances beyond our control but is now rescheduled for early in the New Year before the new season gets underway. Hopefully, the long-awaited ball-wall will be a reality early in 2025.

BALLRAÍOCHT (MEMBERSHIP)

The Club membership in 2024 was again one of the largest in the County, with our numbers exceeding 1,000 for the first time in history. Following stats provided by Club Registrar Damian Fearon:

- 649 Male Members
- 406 Female Members

Youth Members – 552

322 Male Members

230 Female

Adult Members – 503

- 277 Non-playing members
- 29 G4MO
- 135 Adult Male Players
- 62 Adult Female Players

Our Registrar Damian Fearon does a tremendous job coordinating all the memberships and getting most people to register themselves on the Foireann system; ***players and coaches are not insured if they are not registered***. Again, it is essential to stress that all injuries need to be reported to the Club's Insurance Officer, Clare McGilligan, as soon as they happen so that all systems are in place if the claim progresses and there is no harm done if it does not progress.

Damian and Clare have carried out their roles for our members to a very high standard and we thank them sincerely. Thanks to Damian for the updated figures.

COSAINT (SAFEGUARDING/CHILD PROTECTION)

The safety and welfare of our young members is always to the forefront of our minds. Clonduff Club will continue to provide a safe and enjoyable environment where all children feel appreciated when playing our Games. The Club continues to follow the updated GAA Codes of Behaviour as a guidance for all our Policies and Procedures. Our Children's Officer continues to strive for 100% compliance in AccessNI, Safeguarding 1 and Foundation Coaching Award – just short of this target but is being prioritised before the start of the 2025 season and the work has already begun. It is of paramount importance that everyone is safeguarded and this includes the coaches just as much as the players. There were some issues during the year but these were able to be resolved in-house. Thanks to Safeguarding Officer Geraldine for her continuing efforts and for the **attached report**. CLUB SLÁINTIÚIL (HEALTHY CLUB)

Having achieved the Bronze Award at the end of 2023, the club has embarked on achieving the next stage and the healthy Club Officer works in close contact with the Community Officer to achieve this – Awards are only available every 2 years.

At the end of last season our Club was approached by The Confederation of Community Groups about facilitating 'Good Morning' Service providing a phone call to older isolated people in our locality. This is now up and running with the volunteers meeting in Clonduff Club on a weekly basis. Thanks to Geraldine for the ongoing programme and cooperation with Shauna. IMEACHTAÍ POBAIL (COMMUNITY EVENTS)

Shauna and her team ran a very active programme throughout the year in conjunction with the Healthy Club Officer. There were events and activities for all ages and members of the entire community, not just Club members.

We must strive now to get females onto the official list of referees though most of our juvenile football and camogie coaches, and indeed our Youth Players have taken up the whistle at tournaments and Go games. Keep up the good work! It's not an easy task but if we don't have referees, we won't have games!

TEANGA AGUS CULTÚR (LANGUAGE AND CULTURE)

The aims of the GAA include actively promoting, fostering and supporting all aspects of our Cultural Heritage, our Language and our Games. Clonduff very much fulfills those aims, with a new dedicated Language Officer and an acting Cultural Officer in place.

Teanga (Language)

Since becoming Language Officer at the AGM last year, Brian has been very busy in the promotion of our native language – Irish Classes, Primary School Art Competition during Seachtaine na Gaeilge, Bi-lingual Hurling/Camogie training session, Pop-up Gealtacht, engagement with Joe McDonagh Foundation and pending Irish Language signs around the club. Cultúr (Culture)

Clonduff had 52 youngsters participating in the recent Scór Na nÓg 2024 competitions, which are now at the County Final Stage with Clonduff represented in four stage acts plus the Table Quiz. Many thanks to all the children and mentors who prepared them for this level of competition.

TRAENÁLAÍ AGUS CLUICHÍ (COACHING AND GAMES)

The strategy implemented last year, whereby young players did not 'play up' an age group unless there were insufficient numbers at the higher age level, by and large worked well.

TACAIOCHT CLUICHI PEIL (ADULT FOOTBALL GAMES)

The Club fielded adult Men's teams in Senior, Seconds and Thirds. There was also an Over 35s team that participated in and won the An Ríocht Tournament.

In the words of our Club Chair/Adult Games Officer@

'The year was overshadowed by the tragic passing of our senior footballer and hurler Lorcan.

While our players struggled to come to terms with the loss of their teammate and dear friend they performed with great courage throughout the year.

The League and Championship campaigns were not what we had hoped for but, for once, football didn't seem that important'. (Ross Carr)

NA FÓIRNE PEIL ÓIGE (YOUTH TEAMS)

In his report Football Youth Officer, Damian Fearon reported that around 170 boys were involved in Youth Football up to U12 level, with 2 teams fielding at U14 and U16 and a Minor team.

Damian spoke of the obvious strides in Development at U14 and U16 with the U14 Gaels annexing the Div 1 League title for the first time in many years; the U14 Ógs reached their Championship final; U16 Gaels had a strong showing in their league with the Ógs team reaching their league final.

PEIL NA MBÁN (LADIES GAELIC FOOTBALL)

Ladies Gaelic Football in Clonduff continues to grow at a fantastic rate with the club fielding groups at U6 and U8 for the first time ever – up on 60 little girls turned up – previously when combined with the boys there may have been a total of 9/10. This augurs very well for the future.

All the youngsters up to and including U10 participate in blitzes, with U10s, taking part every two weeks. U12s play in a league with no winners – they are 'placed' in preparation for grading two years hence.

All teams competed reasonably well throughout their leagues with the Seniors and U14, rather unexpectedly, reaching their respective semi-finals.

Gaelic for Mothers and Others (G4MO) continues to gain ground in Clonduff and drawing in new-comers to the parish who may or may not have been previously involved in Ladies Gaelic Football.

Our LGFA launched a new U14 tournament, many thanks to the Mooney Family for donating the Mark Mooney Memorial Cup and Shield; we played host to San Francisco Féile team as we have done on a number of occasions.

A very successful Parish Tournament, involving players from U6 to U14 took place at the end of the summer with U16 and Minor players taking responsibility for running the event on the day including refereeing. Very many thanks to all those who coached our LGFA teams in 2024. Special word of thanks to the Senior and Minor players who were involved in coaching the youngsters. IOMÁNAÍOCHT (HURLING)

Juvenile Hurling in Clonduff continues to go from strength to strength in Clonduff with numbers continually on the rise. The U14 Hurlers became the first Clonduff team to reach a Div 1 final.

Clonduff once again hosted the Regional Féile providing another great occasion at the club.

Despite a tough season, the senior team won the Championship Relegation Playoff to maintain their Intermediate status.

There were some very encouraging signs at Minor level with team captain Tommy Smith earning his place in the Senior Hurling team for Championship – Tommy started playing at U8 and has successfully come through the ranks, hopefully the first of many. Other Minor players Ailill Morris (vice-captain) and Ethan O'Kane were strong performers for Down Minor Hurlers in the Ulster and Celtic Challenge Championships.

The Annual Péarce Branagan Memorial Poc Fada was again a resounding success but we still haven't managed to entice many of our very talented Camogs to take up the challenge.

The undoubted highlight of the year was the Annual Sean Cairns Coaching Day and this year the Guest coach was Tipperary Great Eoin Kelly, who endeared himself to everyone who attended this outstanding event in Clonduff. The season came to an end, as usual with the running of the Parish League over a couple of weekends.

Once again, the Senior Camogie team made history by becoming the first Clonduff Camogie team to play Ulster Senior Camogie when they hosted Loughgiel recently in the Ulster Club Semi Final. The visitors were outright favourites going into the game and they lived up to that moniker but not before Clonduff gave them a mighty scare in the first half and drew level at the start of the second half. LIATHRÓID LÁIMHE (HANDBALL)

There was nothing happening on the Handball front as the issues with the Alley have not been resolved. This needs to be a priority for the incoming committee. Handball would be a wonderful indoor winter activity and could easily be developed across the entire club.

SCOILEANNA, COLÁISTÍ AGUS OLLSCOILEANNA (SCHOOLS, COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES)

The Club grounds are always made available to the local primary schools as their needs require. Our grounds are also used to host Colleges games when possible. Thanks to our local primary and secondary schools for continuing to promote our national games and culture.

DISCIPLÍN (DISCIPLINE)

Discipline is not just about the behaviour of our players during games. We all need to be disciplined in our attitude towards the Club and Officials who visit the club. Discipline towards the Club means using the Club facilities for your own enjoyment and leaving the facilities ready for the next group to use. All team mentors should ensure all bottles, clothes and equipment is gathered from the pitches and club premises after each training session or game; and to leave the changing rooms ready for the next group to use – leave as you would like to find! This is an important life-skill for our players to acquire and is a culture which must be instilled from a very early age.

CLUB SÓISIALTA (SOCIAL CLUB)

There were various events, both social and educational held in the clubrooms throughout the year. One of highlights was the very successful St Patrick's Day Festival and Pop-up Gaeltacht; the clubrooms also facilitated a number of regular and new events, based in the Social Events and Healthy Club Programmes.

There was also a number of private functions, ie christening parties and after-funeral meals.

We would like to thank everyone who helped out with the cleaning, setting up, catering and everything else that kept things running smoothly.

FORBAIRT (DEVELOPMENT)

The launch of the Club's 5-Year Strategy was delayed due to forces beyond our control – this will now take place in early January. Many thanks to Grainne Killen and her team for coordinating and compiling this extensive document.

The structure sitting proudly at the bottom of the car park houses our new state-of-the-art gym, club shop and recovery room

The refurbishment of the dressing rooms and visitor toilets have been completed to a very high standard

Floodlights on top and back pitch have been restored and/or upgraded

The physical development of our club is an ongoing process and the next part of the programme will be the Ball Wall.

DEONTAIS (GRANTS)

Thankfully we have a small group of knowledgeable members looking after club grant applications on a voluntary and regular basis. Children and Health and Well Being Officer Annual report

APPENDIX 1 - Children and Welfare

Since commencing my post as Children's Officer together with Health and Well Being Officer my priority was to ensure that all coaches and mentors had completed their Access NI together with their Child Protection level 1 and all those who required refresher courses completed these prior to the training season commencement. I have co-ordinated with the Ulster Council to ensure several face-to-face trainings were provided for Club volunteers and online links were provided.

There has been a significant increase in compliance with both mandatory trainings for all coaches, mentors and volunteers for children within Clonduff Club however we still have not achieved 100% compliance.

Future Action- Moving forward next year it is of imperative importance that EVERY Coach, Mentor and volunteer provide evidence of compliance prior to taking up volunteering position. This is to ensure each, and every adult and child is safeguarded in the year ahead. Without our volunteers and their expertise, we as a club could not operate however it is of paramount importance that everyone is safeguarded.

In total I have received 5 concerns within Hurling, LGFA and GAC which all have been resolved with no further issues.

APPENDIX 2 - Healthy Club

The year commenced in co-ordination with Irish Life and 'Light up Ireland'. We hosted a walk and talk in January and facilitated tea, coffee and hot chocolate for all walkers supporting a local community business.

Future Action– Current walking track unsafe for older people, prams, and kids on balance bikes – options to host this next year?

With the support from the Ulster council, we hosted an information night for coaches, mentors, volunteers and parents focusing on Autism awareness.

Future Action – Plan ahead and ensure minimal training occurring at the time, possible save the dates? Additional SEN Inclusive awareness evenings for coaches, mentors and volunteers creating an awareness and achieve INCLUSIVE CLUB status. Establish links with neighbouring clubs, initiatives and work collectively.

Future Action- Prior to the season commencing host a night for Parents, Coaches, mentors and volunteers promoting and sharing best practice. Sharing code of conduct and establishing a baseline for best practice as a club.

Future Action – Provide a Bullying workshop for coaches, mentors, volunteers and players. Establish Anti Bullying policy.

Health and wellbeing Foundation Award presented to Clonduff this year. I have attended training and worked collaboratively with the secretary of Clonduff in submitting our application and ensuring all criteria was met.

This would not have been possible without the commitment of our Community Officer who provided information evenings on Eating well, Vaping, Drugs awareness and death by suicide cycling awareness initiatives.

Future Action- Establish future and continued links with neighbouring clubs in relation to making Health and well being part of our club.

The big achievement in this department was the establishment of 'GAA For All' which started out in March with 8 children and at the end of the season had 15 children in the programme and they attended 'The Fiddlers Green' Festival for a Fun Day with their counterparts from Rostrevor. U-6 and U-8 Hurling:

The wee **hurlers** continue to make improvements from last **year**. We had up to 15 x Nursery and P1 kids training with us and 35 x P2s, P3s and P4s (age at year beginning) playing throughout the **year**. The nursery and P1s were led by Tom Murphy, Noel Murray and Niall Quinn provided a fun platform to introduce our youngest lads to **hurling**. This year the U6s took part in three blitzes during the year including matches in Pairc Esler under floodlights, a first for this age group. The P2s, P3s and P4s competed in the regional and county blitzes throughout the season and progress from the beginning to end of **year** was evident. Training during the **year** concentrated on fundamental movements and basic skills as well as maintaining core skills like agility, teamwork and coordination. All of these lads are now competent or attempting to raise the ball during matches.

The visit of Eoin Kelly was another highlight of the year and he was particularly impressed with the U8 group adding that they would be well able to compete with his own U8 group.

The coaching team of Tom Murphy, Noel Murray, Niall Quinn, Fionnbharr Murphy, Francis Quinn, Niall Donnan, Jimmy Barber, Paul Keenan, Ciaran Kearney, Ken O'Brien and parents who helped out during the **year** were key to keeping progress within this group. U10 Hurling

The U10 hurlers had an enjoyable year developing their skills along the way. There were some new players joined for their first time and we utilised any surplus of coaches to give extra attention to help these boys catch up with the others. It's never too late to start. Training was twice per week. They attended the various Go Game blitzes organised by Down County Board and Regional Hurling Development officers. There were 10 blitzes attended in total on the days designated by the County Board as dates set aside specifically for hurling.

We select our teams for blitzes evenly with no division of strong or weaker players as the focus at this level is individual development without the distraction or pressure of winning competitions.

This gave a training to game ratio of approximately 3:1.

The objectives of training for this age are skill development under appropriate pressure. The boys also experience the concept of warm up, structured and unstructured drills, competition for possession and agility training.

There is a big emphasis on practicing left and right sided striking.

Given the large number of dual players within the group, communication between football and hurling coaches is essential to ensure schedules run smoothly and players are able to fulfil their passion for both codes.
